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Introduction

Record Keeping and Documentation

Dental nurses may be involved in:

- Updating clinical notes as directed
- Recording patient attendance
- Maintaining confidentiality of patient information

- Ensuring records are stored securely

Incomplete or inaccurate records can compromise patient safety and expose the practice to legal or professional risk.

Confidentiality and Data Protection

All members of the dental team have a responsibility to protect patient confidentiality. This includes written, electronic, and verbal information.

Key confidentiality principles include:
